

Open Class Flower Show

SPECIAL RULES:

1. Entries are open to anyone, adult or junior, wishing to exhibit, except professional arrangers and florists. Junior Division is open to those 17 and under.
2. No pre-fair entries are needed - ENTRIES WILL BE TAKEN 8:00 - 10:00 A.M. Friday, July 19, 2024. Reservations for spaces in Division A, Artistic Arrangements, Classes 1-4, should be made by 5:00 P.M. Thursday, July 18, with Shirley Wolf, 515-351-2300.
3. The Fort Dodge Federated Garden Club will cover entry fees.
4. Judging will begin at 10:30 A.M., Friday, July 19, 2024.
5. Horticulture exhibits should be displayed in clear glass containers, such as catsup bottles, suitable to the size of the specimen. Classes will be divided as needed.
6. All horticulture exhibits MUST be grown by the exhibitor.
7. All exhibits will receive a ribbon placing of blue, red or white. Rosettes of Best of Show and Reserve Best of Show will be awarded in Adult and Junior Division.
8. All exhibits will be released at 3:45 P.M., Friday, July 19, 2024
